

TRAFFIC ACCIDENT CLAIMS A LIFE

SAN IGNACIO, Cayo, Thursday, May 1, 2008:

An early morning traffic accident on the Western Highway has claimed the life of one person.

San Ignacio police reports that the call came in at exactly 4:05 on the morning of Thursday, May 1. Upon arriving on the scene, near the Texaco Kontiki Gas Station, on the outskirts of San Ignacio Town, police saw an overturned, gold color, Mazda 626, four-door car, with license plates CY-C- 27504, with all four wheels in the air.

Approximately 20 feet beyond the overturned car police came upon a male person on the ground bleeding from an injury to the head behind the right ear.

The person was transported to the San Ignacio Town Hospital where he was officially pronounced dead by the medical officer on duty and subsequently identified as **Silvio J. Torund**, 29, Costa Rican Football player residing in the Hills of Promise Area of Benque Viejo Town.

After the extensively damaged car was rolled over onto its wheels all 4 of which were broken and out of place

One of the first persons to arrive on the scene informed that it was exactly 4:00 a.m., when he heard the commotion. He said at first he thought

that a vehicle might have collided into one of the gas pumps but when he rushed outside he saw the overtuned car a few yards pass the gas station.

He immediately called the police and they arrived shortly thereafter.

Preliminary police investigation indicates that the deceased was driving the car towards San Ignacio Town after dropping off a passenger at one of the resorts further up the road when he lost control of the car and ran off the highway. Police suspect that the driver was not wearing a seat belt and was flung from the vehicle.

As the police investigation continues, the body is inside the morgue at the San Ignacio hospital where it awaits the legally required post mortem examination.



What Is Politics? What is Government?

Dear Editor;

Thank you for publishing my article under the caption "Dr. Leo A. Obando Ph.D. is willing to help the national football selection face Mexico in June, 2008" appearing in last weekend's edition of the STAR Newspaper.

In the new edition of the **STAR Newspaper**, I will answer a question posed to me, a few months ago, by a student from Galen University. I do accept that this is only possible vía the MAGIC AND WONDERS of the information super highway - the internet, and this newspaper.

Over the past ten years, I have lectured at several high schools and junior colleges throughout the country of Belize: these include Sacred Heart College in San Ignacio; St. John's College Junior College in Belize City as well as Ecumenical High School and Junior College in Dangriga.

Even though I have been out of the classroom for a short while, I continue to receive numerous questions from former students and concerned Belizeans on varied topics of interest, as the one that follows from a student at Galen:

STATEMENT: Politics is a branch of philosophy, which is the foundation of knowledge. It deals with our existence, with men and women and our roles in society. Believe it or not - Politics is a branch of Philosophy! When you discuss politics, you may actually be philosophizing!

Politics examines how a society is structured, how it should be set up, and how the people should act within that society.

Governments have a Social Contract with its citizens. It is a study of Force; it examines the laws that governs society and the rights that members of society should enjoy and exercise.

QUESTIONS -So...what do you think should characterize Governments? What do think the Government of Belize should do for its citizens...regardless which party is elected?

ANSWER - I support the prelude to the concept but differ as to the definition of the word "POLITICS" I agree that Politics is a branch of philosophy....but I ask the question - whose definition are you talking about? ... Plato, Socrates, Aquinas, Martin Luther, yourself?

If I were to ask you what is your philosophy of life and you were to say: "I don't have one". Does it mean that the word doesn't exist or has no meaning?

In Plato's time, the interpretation of the word "**POLITICS**" as compared to our time, could be similar or totally different. Considering that every word is a Metaphor ...words are not absolute per say and can mean one, two or NADA, at any time based on the TIME, CONTEXT, CULTURE, SPACE, where it is used or was used before.

Governments are not RED, BLUE or GREEN ...Political Parties are... but not governments!

A government is the legal body that runs the affairs of the country on behalf of the people and are accountable to them.

Government as a concept is one of the many elements that make a Political State a State. The others are: territory, people, and the constitution - which is the supreme law of the land...no one is or should be above the law!


FINAL- REVERSING QUESTION? Instead of asking what governments can do for the people-lets answer by saying -What can people do for their

Professional and Technical Scholarship Awards 2008

The Government of Belize is offering Professional and Technical Scholarship Awards for 2008. These scholarships are tenable **ONLY** at the University of the West Indies, the University of Technology in Jamaica, and the University of Guyana.

Limitation to the Awards

The scholarship award is limited to **Bachelor's Degree Programs** only and is applicable for a maximum of three (3) consecutive academic years of study in so far as students remain in good standing for the duration of the program. Only in exceptional cases will the Ministry of Education consider **Post Graduate Programs**.

Coverage of the Awards

The scholarship covers tuition (including Economic Cost), allowances for room and board, books, and incidental expenses. The quantum of such allowances will be based on recommendations obtained by the Ministry of Education from the respective Universities. Airfare and matriculation cost will **NOT** be covered under the scholarship award.

Eligibility

- 1. Applicant must be citizen of Belize
- **2.** Applicant must gain acceptance into the respective Faculty of the University at which he/she proposes to attend.
- **3.** Applicant's course of studies must be from among the following national priorities, which are not listed in order of preference
- a. Agricultural Economics
- **b.** Agriculture Marketing/Trade
- **c.** Chemical/Civil Electrical/ Mechanical Engineering
- d. Computer Science
- e. Curriculum Development
- **f.** Economics
- **g.** Geology
- h. Public Administration
- i. Early Childhood Education & Development
- j. Special Education
- k. Vocational and Technical Education Administration
- l. Hospital Management and Planning
- m. Finance
- **n.** Psychiatry
- **o.** Nursing Administration
- p. Transport Technology
- **q.** Labour and Employment Relations

(Please note that Law and Medicine are not included in the list of National Priorities)

Other Conditions of the Scholarship Award

Each Scholarship recipient will be required to return to Belize whenever he/she successfully completes his/her course of study and to serve the Government of Belize (or with the permission of the Government of Belize, serve in the private sector in his profession or calling) for a period of four years commencing from the date of employment in Belize. Applicants will be required to sign a Bond Agreement with the Government of Belize in this respect.

The scholarship is normally for the duration of the program of studies and requires that the scholarship holder maintains passing grades at the University where he/she is enrolled.

Application Forms can be obtained from the District Education Centers or at the Ministry of Education in Belmopan.

All completed Forms must reach the Ministry of Education in Belmopan no later than **Friday**, **June 6**, **2008**.







The Belize Landowners' Association has scheduled a meeting for ten o'clock on Saturday morning, May 3, at Hode's Place in San Ignacio.


Issues of vital importance to all owners or legal occupiers of private property will be discussed.

San Ignacio's Rotary Club Gets Grant Of Over BZ\$700,000.

The Rotary Club of San Ignacio Receives Grant of \$360,000US for Education

The 2005 National Report and Test Analysis from the Minisry of Education informs that 51% of Belize's Primary School Teachers had no formal teacher training - The Rotary Club of Belize aims to change this statistics.

The Rotary Club of San Ignacio has been awarded a Rotary Foundation 3-H (*Health*, *Hunger & Humanity*) Grant of \$360,000.00 U.S. dollars. These monies will be used to improve teacher training, provide internet access for remote schools and supply elementary teachers across Belize with computers to aid in their lesson preparations.

According to the Project Manager, Rotarian Andre Lopez, 360 primary school "Master Teachers" will directly receive in-depth workshops for teaching math, science and language arts over the next three years and some 2,500 teachers will be trained by the Master Teachers in a proposed cascade model. "Our aim is to raise the P.S.E.pass rate by at least 25%." said Lopez

This ambitious project began modestly five years ago, when Rotarian **Christopher Aird** traveled to Edmonton, Alberta, Canada to confer with members of the Rotary Club of

Nisku-Leduc and the Black Gold School District of Edmonton, Canada.

The result was a plan for a pilot program to upgrade the teaching skills of primary school teachers in the San Ignacio area. With the blessing of Belize's Ministry of Education, four Canadian teachers traveled to Belize binging along suitcases filled with teaching aids, school supplies, posters and games which were distributed to the 60 Belizean teachers who attended the 2 week courses in the summer of 2004 at Sacred Heart College in San Ignacio.

This humble start at improving the skills of Primary School teachers was such a success that it was repeated by popular demand in 2005 and again in 2006.

As word of the success of this local Cayo project, which became known as the "Teacher Professional Development Program", spread, other districts began to ask if they too could be included.

During the summer of 2007, with additional financial support from Rotary district 5370 of Alberta; the Rotary Club of San Ignacio, took the program nationwide.

In partnership with the Ministry of Educatin, eight sites were selected and 360 teachers were chosen to participate in the program

A total of 24 Canadian teachers, who were hosted by Rotarians during their two week stay, taught work shops in

Corozal, Orange Walk, Belmopan, Dangriga, Punta Gorda, San Ignacio and Belize City.

These workshops will continue during the summer of 2008, and in 2009 with the addition of San Pedro and Caye Caulker bringing the number of sites to nine.

The grant will also provide online support in the form of curriculum modules designed specifically to meet the demands of the Belizean educational system and will furnish online teacher support services by Canadian professional classroom facilitators in the art of teaching math, science and language arts.

In addition to orchestrating these workshops, the Rotary Club of San Ignacio gave each Belizean teacher who participated in the 2007 workshops a refurbished desk top computer. These computers were donated by Rotary District 5370 of Alberta, Canada and distributed with the help of other Rotary clubs and the cooperation and technical support of secondary schools throughout Belize.

Belize's 3-H grant committee includes: **André Lopez**, from San Ignacio's Rotary Club, as chairman of the committee.

Other members are: Salvador Espat, Dr. Marcelo Coyi, Rotary Club of Belize City; Bridget Cullerton, Rotary Club of Dangriga; José Chan, Rotary Club of Punta Gorda and Christopher Aird, Rotary Club of San Ignacio.



STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE ASSOCIATION OF CARIBBEAN MEDIA WORKERS (ACM), WESLEY GIBBINGS, GEORGETOWN GUYANA, ON THE OCCASION OF WORLD PRESS FREEDOM DAY MAY 3, 2008

Observance of World Press Freedom Day 2008 establishes the critical link between the untrammelled



Wesley Gibbings ability of people to express themselves and to freely access official information, and their empowerment as citizens.

Some of us correspondingly contend that a principal measure of the power of the people is the extent to which the flow of information, news, opinion and analysis is facilitated by an environment that enables free expression and access to information.

The Caribbean region is, through this injunction, challenged by socio-political antecedents to contemplate a process which would have the impact of effectively transferring responsibility for the future from the grasp of a few to the hands of the people.

It is also a time when crime and violence, economic instability, natural disasters, political conflict and changing global circumstances presage continued uncertainty. The urgency to find solutions and to mitigate impacts is apparent, often in unbridled fashion.

The practice of journalism is unique as a professional function reliant on the view that more, not less, free expression and openness is desirable as a pre-condition for social progress, transparency and participatory democracy. This uniqueness is characterised by the manner in which the media serve as a bridge between civil society and the state.

The ACM also concurs with the Director-General of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) Mr. Koïchiro Matsuura, that press freedom and freedom of information, are "the founding principles for good governance, development and peace."

It is true that professional imperfections militate against achievement of the broader social goals but a penalty of silence is unacceptable as a form of redress against perceived harm.

For reasons such as this, the ACM stands alert to interventions that have the impact of restricting, rather than facilitating free expression. Acts of official censorship, prior restraint and self-censorship in the media are condemned as inimical to the broader cause of progress and growth.

The absence of effective Access to Information laws in some jurisdictions also pronounces unfavourably on the degree to which people are empowered to impact on the decision-making process in a way that affects their everyday lives.

environments are best advised by the view that content restrictions, beyond widely-accepted rules that protect a person's privacy and character and the security of the state, are not supported by the principles of free expression, as defined by Article 19 of the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights, among other hemispheric and international instruments.

The ACM is committed to raising awareness among media professionals on the value of press freedom as a function of freedom of expression with all its attendant benefits to humanity.

We believe professional standards

should rise to meet the requirements of such freedom and that a concerted effort to network Caribbean media professionals, improve standards, instil high ethical standards and to insist on adherence to the principle of press freedom is the responsibility of an organisation such as ours.

On World Press Freedom Day 2008, we re-dedicate ourselves to the task of shaping our profession in a manner that best serves the interests of a region in social and economic transition, challenged by changing global circumstances, impaired by a colonial legacy but committed to building a better future.

Tourism Is Better In The Twin Towns

This Tourist Season in the Western Cayo, twin towns' area, seems better this year. Particularly, for the transient backpacker visitor favoring smaller local accommodations.

They tell me the expensive tourist business is booming, due to professional marketing packages. It looks like in our second year of Falconview Backpackers Hostel, we will double revenue this second year of operation. The return is still in the RED, but encouraging. Unlike our sister hostel on Caye Caulker, (TINAS) which is expected to turn over 9,000 guests this year, our Santa Elena accommodation is only very miniscule in comparison.

Good reputation for exciting trips is the key! There are now two hostels in Cayo West and eight throughout the country. Smaller visitor accommodations are steadily increasing in the Cayo area. We have more beds to sell in the area.

Some of the reasons for increased traffic are;

a) the Greyhound Express bus now making a run between the twin towns and Belize City adding comfort, speed and convenience for the tourist.

b) There is more advertising going out on the tourist attractions of our Western area on the internet, as a winter recreational playground.

c) Often, word of mouth recommendations for individual places are building clientele for warm family friendly accommodations.

Reputation is everything in this business. The places that nickel and dime the tourist with extra charges are not increasing guest volumes, whereas the all inclusive type offerings are attracting tourists. The older tourist trend, just don't want to worry about being ripped off, or haggling, it seems.

A big change I've noticed; is that while the younger ADVENTURE tourist for places like ATM cave and the Mayan Ruins has stayed more or less even in numbers, a growing number of visitors are families, or older couples, seeking simply ordinary summer type visits out of their winter snows and cold places, looking for simple things to do, like canoeing and horseback riding. I've been absolutely shocked by the number of young ladies that do not

want CAVE trips, or pyramids, like the exciting ATM trip, which they consider too strenuous. They do want more summer time family orientated activities.

Camping trips into the Belize Alps would be a big draw I think, for overnighters, from the queries we are getting? Lots of the 20 year olds want a beer garden atmosphere in the evenings, for conversation and socializing. Socializing and partying for our type of crowd is the norm for their vacation.

The HOPKINS resorts are very noticeable in the amount of mini-van runs and tourists they are bringing to our Cayo area. They seem to have a good professional marketing program?

There is certainly room for more Tour Guides, with their own equipment, who offer all inclusive specialty tourist trips, through TOUR OPERATORS, that are different and unique.

Most visitors are staying three nights and going out for two days, before moving on to either the Barrier Reef Cayes, or Guatemala. The more choices of activities the better.

There is a new TOUR OPERATOR in a small office across the street from Mickey's Ice Cream, below the Plaza Hotel. Elias can be called at 610 6474 they are just starting out in the business. We wish them luck and look forward to working with them, soon as they get their ALL INCLUSIVE specialties logistically organized. Please include all charges, lunch and drinking water. Pampered service is the key to the trend away from the younger rough adventure tourist, to the now dominant older family tourists.

We do need an increase in vacation offerings, consuming two or

three days. We also need Tour Operators who can logistically arrange ALL INCLUSIVE trips, with no extra surprise fees and charges afterwards. Tourists get offended if people in a group paid different prices than what they are paying and they find out from their fellow travelers. FREE lunch and drinking water bottles are now the norm on any day trip. If not, the OPERATOR must warn the tourist before they sign up, what extra fees they must shell out during the day. Failure to do that, gains our area a bad reputation. Whether a very rich old tourist, or young poor backpacker, ALL tourists watch how they spend their money. Professionalism, honesty and courtesy are what make tourists happy.

The top happiness draws for this past season seem to be the Kayak trip down the Mopan River to Clarissa Falls, the horseback riding along the Mopan River and up to the Xununtanich, ruins, this trip is organized and run by **Carla** and **Rudolfo Juan** and when we tried to reserve horses, sometimes they were sold out.

There is also the Ultra Light sightseeing flying adventure in a TRIKE over the Belize River valley, held at either daylight, or sunset, when the air goes calm, from Central Farm airstrip.

The Trike finds the day time flying too bumpy, due to heat thermals and the light weight. More TRIKE ultra lights are coming to Western Belize as they do not require registration or licensing internationally and no pilot's

license is required for this type of recreational vehicle.

Ultra lights in Belize are classified as under 1600 lbs gross weight something similar to Canada and usually have limited range due to fuel weight problems. Hang gliders serving the European young crowd, who number several million customers may be coming to Spanish Lookout, or the Rio Bravo escarpment, from the gossip of entrepreneurs speculating on attracting this market of fanatic aficionados.

The Belize Alps has been ruled out for hang gliders, due to clear cutting of the remaining stands of surviving pines ruining the scenery and ambience, along with difficulties of cooperation from government departments, acquiring leases, or land titles for tourism.

I heard about 54,000 tourists visited the Mountain Pine Ridge this season. I'm certainly curious about this BTB figure and how it would break down into sub totals.

Tourism out in Western Cayo is on the upswing again. Working together we can probably enhance the myriad attractions and make our economy grow.

The days of the fly by night, tour operator are pretty much gone, as they should be, as tourist attractions increase and start to bring in larger tourist volumes. More cooperative organization and professional standards are needed locally to ensure a good experience by visitors, to make things grow like the offshore Cayes.
