

# **Over Forty Three Thousand Dollars From Welfare Funds**

#### SAN IGNACIO TOWN, Cayo, Friday, April 23, 2010:

He once served as the Community Development Officer for the Cayo District and today, Nestor Ivan Novelo, 31, from Caledonia Village, Corozal is out on a five thousand dollar bail as he stands accused of dishonestly appropriating almost forty four thousand dollars in cash from the Government of Belize being funds budgeted to provide financial assistance to needy persons in the community.

Reports reaching us indicate that the investigation, by the Audit Department, began a few months ago when several persons, who should have been benefiting from approved social assistance, began complaining about not receiving it.

At the first sign of irregularity in the disbursement of these funds, Novelo was placed on immediate emergency leave. Based on the audit report, Novelo was detained by Corozal Police on Monday, April 19 in Caledonia Village. He was subsequently transported to the San Ignacio police station where, on Wednesday, April 21, he was formally arrested and charged for the theft of \$43,845

being October 2008 and October 2009. The investigation reportedly revealed that the names of at least 6 deceased persons continued to receive financial assistance. According to the report, there

the property of the were instances where approved Government of Belize. The theft beneficiaries reportedly received allegedly occurred between 2 or 3 payments after which they were required to produce supporting evidence to prove that they actually qualified for the assistance. Some people reportedly became frustrated with the repeated requests for

supporting evidence resulting in their giving up on receiving the assistance but the record shows that payments to these persons continued.

There are also reported documented instances where, after receiving 2 or 3 payments, some persons were told that instructions were received from Belmopan to discontinue payment and so these persons stopped visiting the office to collect their allowances but the record shows that payments to these persons continued.

In an effort to tidy up the system, the Audit team is reportedly endeavoring to interview the over 150 persons currently on the social assistance role.

Novelo appeared in San Ignacio Magistrate's court on Wednesday, April 21 where Magistrate Anna Rachel Montejo informed him that because of the quantum of the sum involved, the matter will be transferred on indictment to the Supreme Court. The accused was offered bail in the sum \$5,000 with two sureties of \$2,500 each.

He was ordered to return to court on Monday, July 26, 2010.

## Tourism Sector Hosts Workshop on Multi-Hazard and Contingency Planning

The Belize Tourism Board and the Belize Tourism Industry Association, in collaboration with the Organization of American States, held a two day workshop focusing on Multi-Hazard and Contingency Planning, which would assess and prepare private and public sector tourism satellite interests for natural and man-made hazards on Friday April 16th and Saturday, April 17th at the ITVET Conference Room.

The objective of the workshop was to prepare and train tourism associations covering critical areas such as an institutional framework for management and planning for emergency response and recovery, mitigation for emergencies, damage and needs assessment after an emergency, public relations (national and international) and emergency systems and procedures for individual properties. During the training there was mention of the inception of a tourism emergency management committee that would feed into the national system already in place via NEMO, utilizing local destination committees/clusters for effectiveness.

The Contingency planning process was designed by the Organization of American States, in collaboration with their international partners and implemented in countries across the Caribbean. Day One of the Workshop included an overview of the Project and Institutional Framework for Multi-Hazard Contingency Planning by OAS Country Representative, Kim Osborne. Mrs. Osborne reiterated the need for each establishment such as hotels and craft

markets to institute a mechanism within their establishment "to prepare for, respond to and recover from not only from natural disasters, but man-made disasters as well. The day's activities also included the structure of Belize's emergency framework via the National Emergency Management Organization (NEMO) and hotel security. Day two included a table top emergency simulation exercise and the necessary steps needed to realize an institutional framework for tourism.

Security Specialist for several international tourism entities chaired the sessions on Multi-Hazard Contingency Planning & Hotel Security. Mr. Chin has chaired the Hotel Association of New York City's Safety & Security Committee since 1993, is a member of the American Hotel & Lodging Association Loss Prevention Committee and was certified as an Anti-Terrorism Specialist by the FBI Citizen's Academy.

Present at the two day sessions were Board representatives from the Belize Hotel Association, Belize National Tour Operator Association, Belize National Tour Guide Association, BTIA Destination Chapters, municipal councils/governments, BERT, Belize Tourism Police Unit and several other private sector entities.

## Overcoming Adversities, A "crack baby" makes It To The US Military Academy At West Point

Adversity has stalked 18-yearold **Tyki Nelworth.** His mother is in prison, his father is deceased, and for years he was bounced from home to home.

#### FOR THE RECORD: West Point:

An article in the LATExtra section Friday about a senior at Washington Preparatory High School in South Los Angeles who was accepted to the United States Military Academy at West Point incorrectly said the school was in upstate New York. <u>West</u> <u>Point is about 50 miles north</u> of New York City.

But the senior at Washington Preparatory High School in South Los Angeles kept focused on his academic goals. He took Advanced Placement classes in English, calculus, biology, chemistry and physics, and nailed a 4.23 grade-point average.

Last week, he got his wish: He was accepted and received a four-year scholarship to the United States Military Academy.

"For me to make it to West Point, that's a big statement," said Nelworth, who plans to study engineering at the academy in upstate New York. "It means the sky's the limit."

On Thursday, members of the high school's alumni association joined a group of current students, faculty, parents and other guests at a special "Principal's Breakfast" to honor Nelworth.

"We've watched you display amazing resilience, strength and determination," alumni board member LaQuitta Cole told Nelworth. "You have been an inspiration to everyone you come in contact with, and your efforts have not gone unnoticed."

The soon-to-be cadet was then presented with donations

totaling several hundred dollars to pay for his Advanced Placement tests, his senior dues and transportation to West Point.

He also received two prom tickets, a prom tuxedo, gift cards, clothes and shoes -- donated by alumni, community groups and local churches, among others.

"I'm just overwhelmed," said Nelworth, tears streaming down his cheeks. "I honestly didn't know that there were so many people that cared for me. It's something I definitely won't forget."

Confronted with the tough streets of South L.A., Nelworth could easily have fallen into a life of gangs and crime. He had little money and few clothes, and there were always plenty of illicit temptations.

But he chose to aim high.

"I always use past experiences as motivation . . . not as an excuse not to do something," he <u>"born a crack baby,"</u> Nelworth said. Such infants, who are affected by drugs in the womb, are often developmentally slow.

"That was a pivotal moment in my life," Nelworth said. "I knew I had to keep pushing. I had to become somebody."

Something a pastor once told him became his mantra: "Victory is won by struggling against opposition. Victory is something you have to get up and take charge of."

But it was not an easy journey. Nelworth and his mother, a native of Belize, moved several times over the years, he said. At one point, he was taken away from her because of child neglect.

He lived with an uncle in Los Angeles for a while and then with his older sister in Alabama. When he was in the seventh grade, his father died. Nelworth said he was living with his mother when she was evicted two years ago from her rental home. Earlier this year, she was convicted on drug-related charges and sent to prison.

Nelworth, who once lived in a converted garage, now lives with a cousin and his girlfriend.

Despite a turbulent home life, he never neglected his studies. He graduated from Henry Clay Middle School with straight A's, recalled teachers at Washington Preparatory.

In high school, Nelworth has also enjoyed success in sports. He is captain of the football team, plays baseball and has run track. Last year, he was elected president of the student body.

"For this young man, academics are first," said Todd Ullah, principal of Washington Preparatory. "He cares about people, and that shows in his academic work, the respect he

His wake-up call came the day *never misses an assignment,* his sister told him he had been *never misses school.*"

Mario Estradabran certified "the cause of death to be right side heart failure as a consequence of trombo embolism cerebral hemorrhage". When translated into layman's terms by a medical professional who has always been available to offer advice, it can be interpreted to mean the presence of a blood clot which produced bleeding in the brain possibly associated with failure of the right side of the heart. This condition is reportedly not common in young persons unless there are other underlying medical conditions such as high cholesterol, diabetes or hypertension.

(**Pomona, 22 April**)-Citrus Products of Belize, (CPBL) has received notice of a ruling based on a complaint taken to the Supreme Court last year by the Citrus Growers Association (CGA), challenging the removal of certain CGA appointees to the Board of Directors of CPBL.

CPBL notes that the Courts ruling, handed down this week by Madame Justice Hafiz, basically refused to grant any relief bought by the claimant, CGA and ordered all parties in the case to bear their own cost.

More substantially however, the Court ruled that under the Articles of Association of CPBL, that the said Articles did not apply for the removal of the three Directors - Henry Canton,

## Frank Redmond and Mike Dunker.

The Judge also ruled that she was unable to rule in favour of the CGA on the removal of these three Directors at this times, as this would serve no useful purpose since the next Annual General Meeting is to be held within the next few weeks and that the removal of the directors, at this time, would create administrative difficulties. This has been the position taken by Bank Holdings, the Strategic Investor, at a recent Press Conference held in February of this year.

The Judge advised that both parties to the dispute must work together to make suitable amendments to the Articles of Association, the Share Purchase Agreement and the Investment Agreement.

#### **Press Release**

#### Victory for CGA and its Members

The Court issued its ruling in the case of the Belize Citrus Growers Association Investment Company Limited (BCGAICL) vs. Citrus Products of Belize Limited, Henry Canton, Banks Holdings Limited, Frank Redmond and Michael Duncker. In her determination the Hon. Madam Justice Minnet Hafiz-Bertram found the following:

"In my view, the Claimant being desirous of removing Henry Canton, Michael Duncker and Frank Redmond and to replace them with Rosella Zabaneh, Denzil Jenkins and Antonio Zabaneh, had an absolute right pursuant to Clause 9(1) of the Amended Investment Agreement to inform the Directors by the letter dated the 10<sup>th</sup> day of July 2009 that the Claimant had properly exercised its right to remove them as Directors of the CPBL."

"Accordingly, I disagree with the Second Defendant (Henry Canton) that he was duly appointed by the First Defendant (BCGAICL) as a director of that Company and can only be removed as a director of the Company in accordance with Articles of Association of that Company"

"Further, the court cannot help noticing the confusion which was created as a result of necessary amendments that had to be made to the Articles of Association to incorporate the Investment Agreement. The Company, Citrus Products of Belize Limited ought to seriously scrutinize the Articles of Association, the Initial Investment Agreement and the Amended Investment Agreement and make the necessary amendments to the Articles of the Association."

"Before addressing these provisions, I must consider the argument by the third Defendant (Banks Holdings Ltd.) that his matter should have been submitted to Arbitration pursuant to Clause 30 of the Investment Agreement and so the Claimant (BCGAICL) is therefore precluded from pursuing this claim. In my view, Clause 30 is not applicable to the dispute before the court. The Claimant is therefore, not precluded from pursuing this claim.

The Citrus Growers Association and its subsidiary Belize Citrus Growers Association Investment Company Limited views this as a resounding victory and vindication of the position it has held in this matter. It has the absolute right to remove and replace its directors and it did so by letter on July 10<sup>th</sup> 2009. In the case of Dr. Henry Canton the ruling is clear that BCGAICL does not have to appoint him and did in fact remove him by letter dated 10<sup>th</sup> day of July 2009.

Further the Court's comments on the need to clean up the articles of CPBL is further testament that those individuals who were instrumental in crafting and spearheading the Investment Agreement by not fully and properly implementing agreed recommendations put forward by the Committee of Five has forced the CGA to incur much cost to ensure that the rights of Growers under the Investment Agreement are preserved.

In the case of Banks Holdings Ltd. the Court findings clearly demonstrate that Banks Holdings decision to undermine and not respect the rights of the CGA and its members in appointing its directors was contrary to the Investment Agreement. The allegations made by Banks Holdings in the media and in their petition to the Court, that this was a matter for arbitration and that the CGA was going against the Investment Agreement by referring this matter to the Court, was totally rejected. Also Banks Holdings' comments in the Barbados press that the CGA was acting contrary to the Investment Agreement by removing Henry Canton as a director and taking this matter to the Court is now baseless.

The CGA and its members look forward to continue exercising their rights under the Investment Agreement and to providing the proper governance required to develop both the producer and processing capacity of our Citrus Industry.

## **Disaster Averted By Heroes Of The Hood**

Just before midnight on Saturday, April 17, an electrical fire broke out in a Land Rover parked inside the walled courtyard at the Fox Club on George Price Avenue in Santa Elena, Cayo.

The fire started while the owner and another tenant were soundly sleeping and unaware of what was happening, it did not go unnoticed as **Valerio** "*Junior*" **Estrada** who lives across the street, smelled the heavy aroma of burning rubber and he began to investigate the origin. Most fortunately, at the same time, the Guzman brothers who lives next door arrived with their friends and heeded Junior's warning.

With last week's fire, only two blocks away, still fresh in their minds, they didn't hesitate, and made a dash for the entrance gate.

It took several precious minutes of pounding on the gate and yelling for the owner before they were heard and the magnitude of the situation was

discovered, but once the gate was open they poured through like a well-trained SWAT team and took control of the situation.

Using a hose from the faucet and buckets of water from the rain vat, they were able to lower the heat enough to pop the bonnet and tackle the blaze under it.

Others threw water inside to control that inferno, and it was nothing short of a miracle they were able to remove a full, 10-gallon tank of butane that was at risk of exploding, and would have incinerated everything within the compound and possibly the houses on both sides. Within another few minutes the flames were dying out, but exploding glass and searing steam were still hazards they withstood without any fear or concern for their own safety.

When the Fire Department arrived they let them finish the job, but only smoke and sizzle were left for them to fight.

The "*heroes of the hood*" had saved the day, and sauntered on home like it was something they do every day. And as magnificently as they handled things, it wouldn't be surprising if they do. The whole neighborhood is fortunate to have these outstanding lads around to lend a hand when disaster strikes.

#### WINdows - From WINBelize Women's Issues Newtork Belize

The call came into our office at 10:25 A.M. I could barely hear what she was saying, so I told her to try to relax and speak a bit slower. "Mihusband di beat mi" was what I heard her whispering on the telephone line. I stopped for a second; I could now recognize that I was speaking to an elderly woman. So I asked her if she had called the Police, she told me that she had done so several times and no one had come to her aid. I proceeded to ask her how old she was and how I could assist her, she told me she was eighty seven and her husband was seventy five. She told me she lived on the Southside of the city and that she had been dealing with abuse for a number of years. The abuse came because of her inability to perform sexually as she was diagnosed with cervical cancer. Engaging in sexual intercourse, she told me, could mean death for her. After I got over the initial shock of knowing that women of all ages in Belize have to deal with Domestic Violence and that a seventy five year old man was still sexually capable, I gathered my thoughts and proceeded to see what could be done to assist this woman.

I somehow felt an instant connection with this woman; I wanted to know her story. I just could not imagine my grandmother going through domestic violence. Even thinking about how easy it would be for her to sustain injuries, she was in her golden years, and should be relaxing, enjoying her life. I felt that from my

experiences in life this would be one of the cases that would stand out in my line of work. I asked her for her address for I had to intervene. After all, the Police would not assist; perhaps they had more pressing issues to deal with. I was not afraid, besides a seventy five year old man would have a hard time putting his hands up to me. So I got in my car and drove to the house. When I got there a frail, crying and scared woman greeted me. She had no family members in Belize, no children; she was all alone with this man. They had been married for fifty years, he was the "only man" she knew. It is so unfair for this woman to suffer for such reasons beyond her control when in essence there comes a time in a man's life where he too becomes unable to perform as per normal. It leaves one to wonder if as women, even in our golden years we have to worry about our safety from the very men we've lived to care for. Should we call her years the brass years? Surely does not sound golden.

After this experience, I learned that we are all vulnerable at different times in our lives, I was a victim myself. It was not physical, but it was everything else. If I got home from work five minutes late I was cheating, everything that was heard about me was automatically true and all my days became unpredictable. The judge, jury and court of public opinions were in that one person. I did not know who I would meet home; sometimes I was scared to go home, always thinking if my partner would be in a good or bad mood. I was the

breadwinner in the house, yet I was subjected to emotional and psychological abuse. Every object dashed across the room was my fault, I had to put on reserve whatever I was feeling, and I could not even get mad without my partner getting more upset than me. I did not leave the relationship because of what I was going through, I chose to stay. I cannot tell you why I stayed. I had all the information, I knew where to go, who to call, yet I did nothing.

Some women experience domestic violence throughout their lives or at different times in their lives, while we are often quick to judge women it is good to be supportive and understanding of their plights. Women stay in domestic violence for different reasons. Some women are quick to brag that they don't

get beaten so they believe they do not suffer abuse. There are five different forms of abuse; physical, financial, verbal, emotional and sexual. While some women experience varying degrees of abuse, generally, when one form of abuse exists, it is coupled with other forms as well.

It is important for women to know where they can get assistance if they are experiencing abuse. Women should call the domestic violence unit at 227-2222 and the Women's Department at 227-7397. There is no reason for women to suffer in silence, abuse often turns deadly. Anyone can be a victim of domestic or family violence, family background, age, race, or economic status have very little to do with ones vulnerability to abuse. Speak out about abuse; Silence has a price!

## **Shish Caught Red Handed Breaking Into One Of Two Vehicles**

A San Ignacio man was today arrested and charged with two counts of theft and one count of damage to property after he was caught red handed breaking into one of two vehicles.

after receiving the call, police observed that the accused had removed several personal items from inside the car including the vehicle's CD player and other items that Sedasey had, earlier that day, purchased in Spanish Lookout valued at \$791.00.

The man was identified as **Ian** Shish, 25, Belizean labourer, residing on the neighboring Macal Street.

Further investigation revealed that a grey Toyota Hilux, belonging to Juan Ortiz, 22, Belizean businessman also of #18 Back Street, parked on the same street side in front of the house, was broken into and

personal property valued a \$1,251 were missing. The investigation revealed that entry into the Hilux was gained by damaging the lock on the passenger side of the vehicle.

After he was detained, the accused led police to his house nearby where the items stolen from the Hilux were recovered.

The accused appeared before Magistrate Anna Rachel Montejo in San Ignacio's magistrate court on Wednesday, April 21, where he pled guilty to the two counts of theft. He was fined \$505.00 on each count one to be paid by May 31 and the other to be paid by July 31, in default of payment, 1 year imprisonment. While he initially pled guilty to the charge of damage to property in relation to the door lock on Juan Ortiz' Hilux, the accused did not agree with the facts as presented by prosecutor George Gomez consequently prompting Magistrate Montejo to enter a not guilty plea. He was granted bail in the sum of \$1,000 and ordered to return to court on Friday, May 14, 2010.

### **Cracking Down On Burglary Reports San Ignacio Police Arrest Parham**

#### SAN IGNACIO TOWN, Cayo, Monday, April 19, 2010:

As San Ignacio police continue to crack down on the increasing reports of burglary committed within the twin towns another man stands accused, this time not for burglary, but for handling goods reported stolen from the home of an American Professor.

Ron Wikins, 64, American Professor of a Sankar Street address in San Ignacio reported to police that he departed Belize on April 6, 2010 enroute to Los Angeles, California. He was only gone for two days when he received an email from an acquaintance informing him that his house was burglarized. He returned to Belize two days later, on April 10, and confirmed that his house was indeed burglarized and that entry/exit was gained by damaging the locks of two doors.

An inventory revealed the loss of \$12,730 worth of missing property including several pieces of electrical tools, a flat screen Sony television set and an air conditioning unit. All insured

with RF&G Insurance.

Police investigation led to the arrest, five days later, on Thursday, April 15, of Owen Alexander Parham, 33, Belizean, unemployed of a Perez Street address in Santa Elena Town. A search of Perez's house led to the discovery of an air conditioning unit and a compass which were positively identified by the professor as his property.

Further investigation also led to the recovery, on the following day, Friday, April 16, of several pieces of electrical tools including a skill saw, an electric drill and other items

from a house also in Santa Elena. The person found in possession of these items reportedly told the police that Parham visited his home a few days earlier and told him that he has completed a construction job and was getting rid of the tools which he offered for sale for \$200.

In view of the lack of evidence connecting him to the burglary, Parham was merely arrested for two counts of handling stolen goods, being one count for the items found

in his house on Thursday, April 15 and the other for the items found at the other location the very next day, Friday, April 16. The accused appeared before Magistrate Anna Rachel Montejo on Monday, April 19 where he entered a not guilty plea. He was offered bail in the sum of \$5,000 and ordered to return to court on Tuesday, May 18, 2010. He was unable to meet bail and was transported to the central prison in Hattieville.
