The police case against the two Belizean men from San Jose Succotz, Cayo began on a Sunday morning, September 16, 2012 when, at around 9:30, acting upon information received, two policemen intercepted, near the

When the bag was opened it was found to contain two parcels of marijuana. The car and the two men were escorted to the police station where, when measured, the parcels of weed registered a combined 7,257.4 grams being 16 pounds.

The men first appeared in court on Monday, September 17, 2012 where they pled not guilty of a joint drug trafficking charge.

After numerous adjournments, the case finally came to an end today resulting in a guilty verdict against both defendants.

Magistrate Narda Morgan ordered for them to forthwith pay a one thousand dollar fine, in default of payment they are to serve three years in jail. Magistrate Morgan furthered sentenced them to three years in jail. The look of astonishment remained on their faces as they departed the courtroom under police guard to begin spending time in jail.

A Plan To Capture Young Minds As A Bulwark Against Poverty And Crime

It is a well known fact that if we can capture the minds of the young in a positive, constructive way, we can mold a future generation of great achievers its people can be proud of. If we can get them interested in education and learning at an early age, it is quite likely, that for a majority, this zeal will continue through adolescence and adulthood, and may provide a bulwark against poverty and crime.

Belize is a developing country with many of the attendant problems of one. Statistics on poverty and crime reflect the dire need for better education and training which could result in gainful employment for our graduates and young people. Such an outcome, obviously, requires the full active participation of parents, schools, churches, government, industry, media, and civil society. In other words, it does take a village, a neighborhood, a family, to raise a child.

While it is difficult sometimes to overcome the ills which create poverty and hopelessness, we as a society need to create a mindset in our youths that that despair is not insurmountable, and that things can be better through preparation now in school for a better life, a preparation that begins at the primary school level.

Life was not easy for many of us growing up in Belize especially for grown-ups who had to provide for a family when permanent jobs for the uneducated and unskilled were hard to come by. Many shared the same fate, but we managed to get through even the harder times, and relatively few resorted to a life of crime. So what has changed today? We still have poverty and hard times like we did before, but now this is accompanied by a greater intensification of crime unparalleled in the older days. Yes, now is not your grandparents times; we live in a world where modernity has exposed us to instant gratification, more travel, more television news, and

more wants, and unfortunately, more drugs, more guns, more gangs, and more violence. But together through education, job creation, and alternative programs, we can change, or at least, hopefully, significantly reduce this trend.

We need to attack this problem on various fronts simultaneously, programs for our children in primary schools starting with standards 5 and 6, and media programs to create greater understanding and civility among our people. I will try to address both issues by offering some suggestions.

I will start with our primary schools. Our teachers do a great job of teaching the three Rs. While these subjects are important, there needs to be a way to make the syllabus and teaching format more exciting, fun, and useful to motivate our children to learn. How do we do this? Certain aspects of mathematics and physical demonstrations in basic sciences can garner such new excitements. We need to introduce the fun in science and mathematics at an early age at an appropriate level to excite. A child may not understand atmospheric pressure, but he/she is amazed when they see a coke can collapsing after all the air inside has been removed. We appear to change water into wine by adding a colorless indicator and a sodium hydroxide solution to the water resulting in a pinkish wine color change in the water. I've done this before for school children in Akron. Colorado when I used to work as a Soil Scientist at the Agricultural Research Station, and to them it's magic. There are countless such demonstrations to excite children. The same can be done with numbers where you tell people's ages or tell hidden numbers or cards using mathematics. These excite even adults. Sure, there may be need for some teacher training in the basic sciences if such does not exist already, but it is worth the budget increase if it excites children to have inquisitive minds. Additionally, the schools need to promote science fairs for the students where parents are invited to participate with their children, and to see the end products in a scheduled school event. Other positive activities for school children undoubtedly exist. While there is no guarantee how a child will end up, we need to stack the deck early in their favor for success. We need to have our primary school children want to go to high school and beyond, and have the opportunity to do so.

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Now for the parents and community: we need to build a positive upbeat attitude among our people; the media, print and TV, need to play a more active role. The enemy is poverty, and lack of jobs and appropriate training and education. We need to change this feeling of hopelessness and huge indifference among those who could help. We have this tendency sometimes, to blame all but ourselves: colonialism, America and its TV programs and culture, religion, people not like ourselves, you name it. Sure there is enough blame to go around and the starting points we were given were not favorable. But we need to dig out of this rut ourselves; other developing nations have done it. We can do it. We have to do it.

At least once a week, our

media through programs, need to present a positive view of us: our pioneering leaders, our diverse people and cultures, our connections culturally with the Eastern Caribbean States, and geographically, with Mesoamerica. We are a people now with links to both. We need to learn not only of Price, Goldson, Pollard, etc, but of Manley of Jamaica, Hidalgo and Juarez of Mexico, Castro of Cuba, Bolivar of South America. We need heroes, positive role models we can emulate, can be proud of. This list could be expanded to include King, Gandhi, Mandela, and for the meek of heart, Mother Theresa; you provide your own list; it can be down to earth as your favorite teacher or pastor. In short, while still adhering to accountability, we need to back away from our politics of blame and retribution, and foster one of cooperation and positive nation building. Our children deserve no less.

Change will not come overnight. But why can't tomorrow be that new day, that new beginning? I invite you to comment on this piece, and to offer your own diagnosis and prescriptions for a safer, more joyful, and more prosperous Belize.

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A Senior Citizen Allegedly Abused

As a productive citizen of this community, I cannot allow for the abuse of my elderly father, at the hands of a policeman attached to the station in San Ignacio, to just disappear under the radar.

I am publicizing this incident in the hope that such ill treatment does not befall another person, more so an elderly citizen in my community or anywhere else in this beautiful country of ours.

I know that this kind of official abuse is not tolerated by the Government of the day, the current Minister of Police or the Commissioner of Police. So I ask, "Why is it then that some police abuse the very people they are sworn to serve and protect despite the clear mandate of those to whom they *must answer?*" The only answer that comes to mind is disrespect and the lack of discipline. Disrespect for the uniform they wear and disrespect for their superiors.

My 77 year old father's unfortunate encounter with a rogue policeman occurred on Tuesday, May 27, 2014 while he was making his routine visit to the farmers' market in the Savannah

Area of San Ignacio Town. My Dad was approached by a policeman whose rank, regulation number and name I learnt to be Police Constable #1604 Pedro Gongora.

Eyewitnesses confirm that this abusive policeman walked up to my father and in a harsh manner told him that he was begging at the market. He then ordered my Dad to raise his hands to be searched for, of all things, drugs.

Being placed in this embarrassing condition my Dad asked for at least a little respect given his age and his medical condition. During the search the police irritated the mid section of my Dad's body affected by "Shingles" a condition he has been living with for over 10 years. Reaction to the pain caused by the contact combined with the policeman, "don't give a darn" attitude, resulted in my Dad reciprocating the physical contact. He grabbed the policeman by the shirt while protesting the pain the police was causing him.

The policeman did not take lightly to my Dad's reaction resulting in him punching my Dad

to the right side of the face after which he handcuffed my Dad. He was dragged to the station and placed in a small holding cell with other detainees.

Probably a new policeman in town, with no knowledge of my father's history in this town, the tables turned when other policeman at the station realized that the injured, detained person handcuffed and pulled from the cell was Mr. Leroy Lisbey popularly known by all as "Lawton". He is no beggar. He is a regular fixture at the market in San Ignacio. In his younger years he was a professional auto mechanic and a good one at that. He operates a stall at the market on Saturday's where he sells auto mechanic tools, vehicle parts, lawn mowers and other hardware items.

Realizing the error of this abusive policeman, no charge was levied against my father and he was allowed to leave the station. This however does not remove from the fact that my father was disrespected and injured by an abusive policeman in the unprofessional execution of his duties. The abuse of citizens at the hands of the police, especially senior citizens, has got to stop. Police officers should be properly trained and closely supervised, especially the rogue ones, to ensure that they perform their duties in nothing but a professional manner at all times. We pray that this is the last such unprofessional behavior of this particular policeman. We hope that others take heed and not venture down this disrespectful path.

What Is Obesity?

An obese person has accumulated so much body fat that it might have a negative effect on their health. If a person's bodyweight is at least 20% higher than it should be, he or she is considered obese. If your Body Mass Index (**BMI**) is between 25 and 29.9 you are considered overweight. If your BMI is 30 or over you are considered obese.

What is Body Mass Index (BMI)?

The BMI is a statistical measurement derived from your height and weight. Although it is considered to be a useful way to estimate healthy body weight, it does not measure the percentage of body fat. The BMI measurement can sometimes be misleading - a muscleman may have a high BMI but have much less fat than an unfit person whose BMI is lower. However, in general, the BMI measurement can be a useful indicator for the 'average person'.

Why do people become obese?

People become obese for several reasons, including: Body mass measurement, consuming too many calories.

People are eating much more than they used to. This used to be the case just in developed nations - however, the trend has spread worldwide. Despite billions of dollars being spent on public awareness campaigns that attempt to encourage people to eat healthily, the majority of us continue to overeat. In 1980 14% of the adult population of the

computers, video games, remote controls, washing machines, dish washers and other modern convenience devices, the majority of people are leading a much more sedentary lifestyle compared to their parents and grandparents. Some decades ago shopping consisted of walking down the road to the high street where one could find the grocers, bakers, banks, etc. As large out-of-town supermarkets and shopping malls started to appear, people moved from using their feet to driving their cars to get their provisions. In some countries, such as the USA, dependence on the car has become so strong that many people will drive even if their destination is only half-a-mile away.

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The less you move around the fewer calories you burn. However, this is not only a question of calories. Physical activity has an effect on how your hormones work, and hormones have an effect on how your body deals with food. Several studies have shown that physical activity has a beneficial effect on your insulin levels - keeping them stable. Unstable insulin levels are closely associated with weight gain.

Not sleeping enough.

If you do not sleep enough your risk of becoming obese doubles, according to research carried out at Warwick Medical School at the University of Warwick. The risk applies to both adults and children. Professor Francesco **Cappuccio** and team reviewed evidence in over 28,000 children and 15,000 adults. Their evidence clearly showed that sleep deprivation significantly increased obesity risk in both groups. Professor Cappuccio said, "The 'epidemic' of obesity is paralleled by a 'silent epidemic' of reduced sleep duration with short sleep duration linked to increased risk of obesity both in adults and in children. These trends are detectable in adults as well as in children as young as 5 years."

appetite as a result of hormonal changes. If you do not sleep enough you produce Ghrelin, a hormone that stimulates appetite. Lack of sleep also results in your body producing less Leptin, a hormone that suppresses appetite.

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Endocrine disruptors, such as some foods that interfere with lipid metabolism.

A team from the University of Barcelona (*UB*) led by Dr Juan Carlos Laguna published a study in the journal Hepatology that provides clues to the molecular mechanism through which fructose (*a type of sugar*) in beverages may alter lipid energy metabolism and cause fatty liver and metabolic syndrome.

Fructose is mainly metabolized in the liver, the target organ of the metabolic alterations caused by the consumption of this sugar. In this study, receiving fructoserats containing beverages presented a pathology similar to metabolic syndrome, which in the short term causes lipid accumulation(hypertriglyceridemia) and fatty liver, and eventually leads to hypertension, resistance to insulin, diabetes and obesity.

Poorly balanced diets and the lack of physical exercise are key factors in the increase of obesity and other metabolic diseases in modern societies. In epidemiological studies in humans, the effect of the intake of fructose-sweetened beverages also seems to be more intense in women. (*From - ''New Data On Fructose-Sweetened Beverages And Hepatic Metabolism''*).

Although there appears to be a consensus on the negative effects of fructose-sweetened beverages there is still some debate over the effects of fructose versus high fructose corn syrup - two studies of note are:"AMA Finds High Fructose Syrup Unlikely To Be More Harmful To Health Than Other Caloric Sweeteners" and "Fructose Sweetened Drinks Increase Nonfasting Triglycerides In Obese Adults".

Fructose effect on the brain may promote obesity - researchers from Yale University School of Medicine compared the effects of fructose and glucose on the brain with MRI scans and found that high fructose diets may be behind the current obesity epidemic.

In an article published in JAMA (Journal of the American Medical Association), the authors said they found that regions in the brain that regulate appetite became active when people consumed glucose, but remained inactive when they ingested fructose. When those regions become active, they release hormones that produce feelings of satiety (fullness) - in other words, the hormones tell you to stop eating.

Lower rates of smoking (smoking suppresses appetite).

According to the National Institutes of Health (NIH) "Not everyone gains weight when they stop smoking. Among people who do, the average weight gain is between 6 and 8 pounds. Roughly 10 percent of people who stop smoking gain a large amount of weight - 30 pounds or more."

Medications that make patients put on weight.

According to an article in Annals of Pharmacotherapy, some medications cause weight gain. "Clinically significant weight gain is associated with some commonly prescribed medicines. There is wide Please Turn To Page 10

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Its 65th Annual General Meeting

St. Martin Credit Union (SMCU) celebrated its 65th Annual General Meeting at the Octavia Waight Center Auditorium. A large number of credit union members from San Ignacio, Santa Elena, Benque Viejo and surrounding communities came to celebrate the occasion.

Master of Ceremony for the occasion was **Rene Torres**, vice president of **SMCU**. The **VP** welcomed everyone and introduced the Board of Directors after which the meeting was called to order by **Dr. John Morris**, president of **SMCU** with the singing of the National Anthem with background music provided by the **Marimba Academy of Benque Viejo's House of Culture**.

The minutes of the AGM 2013 was read by the Secretary, **Carlton McKoy** in which he highlighted the 7% growth in comparison to the previous year. Shares also grew by approximately 10% from 12.14 million in 2012 to 13.3 million in 2013. He said that membership grew at an average of 32-34 members per month. The Union also recorded a profit of \$602,294.

For his part Dr. John Morris gave a summary of the Board of Directors' Report informing the assets currently stand at \$17,985,534 being an increase of 8% as compared to last year. He informed that this year the credit union attracted over eight hundred new members. The highlight of Dr. Morris' presentation was the successfully renovation of the credit union building including the lobby and the welcome area at the Credit Union. He said that the space in now more user-friendly with increased space in the waiting area. He also told the gathering that the ATM service is growing. He encouraged more members to take advantage of this service. He ended by thanking the Board of Directors for the selfless volunteer work they continue to

expend to ensure the success of the credit union as the engage in plans to open a branches this year in Benque Viejo Town.

Next to address members was **Andy Bahadur** who chairs the credit committee, He said the number of loans approved this year has increased. A total of 4,213 loans were requested and 4,017 were approved. Of the approved loans, 20.6% was for personal use, 13.5% was for education, 11.7% for vehicle/repairs, 10.7% for house repair and renovation. As the credit union continues to minimize delinquency, he encouraged members to visit the office and to speak to the staff when they encounter difficulties in servicing their loans.

Ms. Laura Sierra, in her capacity as chair of the Supervisory Committee told members that the committee reviewed all the books and records. She said the in the revision process the committee identified areas of improvement which has been submitted to the Management and to the Board for further discussion and eventual implementation. She concluded by informing that the supervisory committee is satisfies that the credit union has been adhering to established financial policies and procedures as it continues the work to further strengthen it operations.

In presenting the treasurers report, **Mrs. Debbie Martinez** informed SMCU recorded a growth of \$1,563,072 in total assets, an increase of 9.55%. The increase in shares, she said means that members are saving and should continue saving for rainy days. She said that the goal of the credit union is to continue serve its members to the best of its ability.

Ex-Ecuador President Mahuad Sentenced To 12 Years In Jail

A court in Ecuador has sentenced former **President Jamil Mahuad** in absentia to 12 years in jail for embezzlement.

The ruling comes two days after Interpol issued a warrant for his arrest. He denies any wrongdoing.

Mr Mahuad fled to the United States in 2000 after a military coup.

He was accused of ordering banks to close for several days and freezing the accounts of ordinary citizens to protect the interests of bankers associated with him.

The decision, taken in March 1999, came during a serious economic crisis.

Ecuador was struggling at the time with high inflation, a devalued currency

and historically low prices for oil, its main export.

Mr Mahuad had been in office for less than a year.

"The crime committed by the accused caused huge social turmoil," Judge Ximena Vintimilla said in her ruling.

"Its consequences are still being felt by Ecuadorean society to this day," she added.

On Tuesday, Interpol issued an international warrant for Mr Mahuad. He released a statement saying the case against him was politically charged.

Mr Mahuad accused the left-wing government of the current President, **Rafael Correa**, of meddling in the judiciary system.

"The whole world knows the current situation faced by Ecuador's legal system and its role in the persecution of journalists and critics of the government," he said in a statement.

The Ecuadorean government rejects the allegations.

"There's no political persecu-

tion here. What Ecuadorean justice seeks is the punishment of common criminal acts," Interior Minister Jose Serrano told reporters on Tuesday.

Mr Mahuad's supporters say he should be remembered for his battle to save the country's economy and for signing a peace treaty with Peru.

The two countries had a brief border conflict in 1995 and were on the brink of a new war when Mr Mahuad took office in 1998.

The decision led to Mr Mahuad and his Peruvian counterpart, **Alberto Fujimori**, being nominated for the Nobel peace prize.

Truth Or Lie SAN IGNACIO TOWN, Cayo, Friday, May 23, 2014: guardian, reported the matter months later, on May 16, 2014

A mother in jail on a report made by her 11 year old daughter. San Ignacio police this week reported the disturbing news of a mother remanded to prison for allegedly prostituting her 11 year old daughter.

While the report is disturbing, the information bears several inconsistencies as the child, residing in a Cayo village with a guardian, reported the matter 4 months later, on May 16, 2014. Furthermore, the report indicates that the alleged incident occurred throughout the entire month of December 2013, from the 1st right up to the 31st December 2013 when she was staying with her mother who at the time was residing in Dangriga.

The child was medically examined and the medical practitioner certified that child has experienced activity of a sexual nature

Informing of only one encounter, the child, in a statement to police, informed that her mother threatened to beat her if she did not have sex with the man. Fearing that her mother would carry out the threat, she allegedly engaged with the man *"in some nearby bushes"*. She reported seeing when the man gave her mother a fifty dollar bill before leaving.

Despite alleging encounters spanning an entire month, the report speaks of a single encounter as it bears no information of any further sexual contact between the man and the child.

Is this poor police work, the curtailing of information or a fabricated report to conceal something else? Notwithstanding a mother is in jail and police is on the lookout for the alleged perpetuator.

The matter was adjourned July 8, 2014 on instructions for it to be transferred to Dangriga in the Stann Creek judicial district where the incident is alleged to have occurred.

The Belize Electric Company Limited (BECOL) in collaboration with the National Emergency Management Organization (NEMO), and the Department of Environment (DOE) hosted a public discussion for the twin towns of San Ignacio and Santa Elena on Friday, May 16 2014 at 6:00 p.m. at the Cayo Welcome Center in San Ignacio Town to discuss matters relating to the dam break early warning system. Announcements via local radio and television were sent out for public notice on May 6 2014 informing the public of the venue and time of the event. The original venue was Hode's Place San Ignacio Town. A change of venue from Hode's Place to the Cayo Welcome Center was agreed after discussion with BECOL, DOE and NEMO. Announcements with the revised venue were sent to the local radio and television stations on May 8 and 9, 2014. Flyers were distributed on May 12 2014 to the various businesses in San Ignacio Town and Santa Elena Town. The announcements were publicized until May 16, 2014.

This annual event is to educate the public on what to do in the event of a dam break. The Early Warning System (EWS) is part of the Emergency Preparedness Plan (EPP) and is designed to alert the public of a possible dam break. The public education session educates the public on where the safe zones are located. Signs are also installed to guide the public to the safe zones. The education process is conducted with the assistance of audio visuals and maps to sensitize the audience of the areas that would be inundated.

This exercise targets the stakeholders along the Macal and Mopan Rivers and is executed by visiting the schools and conducting public education sessions in the villages, towns and resorts. It is an ongoing process in which BECOL, NEMO, DOE and the communities interact to educate stakeholders as well as to discuss ideas on how to better communicate

with stakeholders to make sure everyone is aware of the various safety and emergency plans that are in place.

Due to the feedback that some stakeholders missed the last event because of the change of venue, BECOL, NEMO and the DOE are planning a second session to be held at the Cayo Welcome Center on Saturday May 31, 2014 from 8:00 a.m. to 12.00 noon. Remembering Maya Angelou A Phenomenal Woman!

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Maya Angelou

Marguerite Johnson was born in St. Louis, Missouri, on April 4, 1928, the second child of Bailey Johnson, a doorman and a navy dietitian, and Vivian (Baxter) Johnson, a nurse and card dealer. Angelou's older brother, Bailey Jr., nicknamed Marguerite "Maya", derived from "My" or "Mya Sister". When Angelou was three and her brother four, their parents' "calamitous marriage" ended, and their father sent them to Stamps, Arkansas, alone by train, to live with their paternal grandmother, Annie Henderson. In "an astonishing exception" to the harsh economics of African-Americans of the time, Angelou's grandmother prospered financially during the Great Depression and World War II because the general store she owned sold needed basic commodities and because "she made wise and honest investments". Four years later, the children's father "came to Stamps without warning" and returned them to their mother's care in St. Louis. At the age of eight, while living with her mother, Angelou was sexually abused and raped by her mother's boyfriend, a man named Freeman. She told her brother, who told the rest of their family. Freeman was found guilty but was jailed for only one day. Four days after his release,

he was murdered (kicked to death), probably by Angelou's uncles. In response, Angelou became mute for almost five years, believing, as she stated, "I thought, my voice killed him; I killed that man, because I told his name. And then I thought I would never speak again, because my voice would kill anyone ..." According to Marcia Ann Gillespie and her colleagues, who wrote a biography about Angelou, it was during this period of silence when Angelou developed her extraordinary memory, her love for books and literature, and her ability to listen and observe the world around her.

Shortly after Freeman's murder, Angelou and her brother were sent back to their grandmother. Angelou credits a School. Before graduating, she worked as the first black female streetcar conductor in San Francisco. Three weeks after completing school, at the age of 17, she gave birth to her son, Clyde (who later changed his name to Guy Johnson).

Angelou's second autobiography, Gather Together in My Name (1974), recounts her life from age 17 to 19 and "depicts a single mother's slide down the social ladder into poverty and crime." Angelou worked as "the front woman/ business manager for prostitutes," restaurant cook, and prostitute. She moved through a series of relationships, occupations, and cities as she attempted to raise her son without job training or advanced education.

Maya Angelou (born Marguerite Ann Johnson; April 4, 1928 - May 28, 2014) was an American author and poet. She published seven autobiographies, three books of essays, and several books of poetry, and is credited with a list of plays, movies, and television shows spanning more than 50 years. She received dozens of awards and over 30 honorary doctoral degrees. Angelou is best known for her series of seven autobiographies, which focus on her childhood and early adult experiences. The first, I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings (1969), tells of her life up to the age of seventeen and brought her international recognition and

the first lifetime Reynolds Professorship of American Studies. She was active in the Civil Rights movement, and worked with Martin Luther King, Jr. and Malcolm X. Since the 1990s, she made around 80 appearances a year on the lecture circuit, something she continued into her eighties. In 1993, Angelou recited her poem "On the Pulse of Morning" (1993) at President Bill Clinton's inauguration, making her the first poet to make an inaugural recitation since Robert Frost at John F. Kennedy's inauguration in 1961.

With the publication of I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings, Angelou publicly discussed aspects of her personal life. She was respected as a spokesperson of black people and women, and her works have been considered a defense of black culture. Attempts have been made to ban her books from some US libraries, but her works are widely used in schools and universities worldwide. Angelou's major works have been labeled as autobiographical fiction, but many critics have characterized them as autobiographies. She made a deliberate attempt to challenge the common structure of the autobiography by critiquing, changing, and expanding the genre. Her books center on themes such as racism, identity, family, and travel.

Angelou died on the morning of May 28, 2014, according to a family statement. She was found by her nurse. Although Angelou had reportedly been in poor health and had canceled recent scheduled appearances, she was working on another book, an autobiography about her experiences with national and world leaders. Tributes to Angelou and condolences were paid by artists, entertainers, and world leaders, including Barack Obama and Bill Clinton. Harold Augenbraum, from the National Book Foundation, said that Angelou's "legacy is one that all writers and readers across the world can admire and aspire to."

She became a poet and writer after a series of occupations as a young adult, including fry cook, prostitute, nightclub dancer and performer, cast member of the opera Porgy and Bess, coordinator for the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, and journalist in Egypt and Ghana during the days of decolonization. She was an actor, writer, director, and producer of plays, movies, and public television programs. Since 1982, she taught at Wake Forest University in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, where she held


